

# MRS. SELIGMAN FINDS BURGLAR UNDER BED

## Masked Man Robs Her and Mrs. Lewisohn of Jewelry in Adirondack Camp.

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LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Sept. 7.—Police of the principal Adirondack villages are co-operating with the police of New York, Albany and other cities to the south, and Malone, Plattsburg and Montreal on the north, in a hunt for the burglar who early last Friday morning entered the upper Saranac Lake camp of Mrs. Isaac N. Seligman, of New York, and escaped after robbing her and her camp guest, Mrs. Adolph S. Lewisohn, of jewelry valued at approximately \$10,000.

Mrs. Seligman, who reported the robbery to the police of the village of Tupper Lake, stated that she was awakened by a noise in her bedroom at 5 o'clock in the morning. She did not throw on the room light, but used a small hand flashlight to investigate, and discovered that the drawer of her dresser was on the floor and its contents were strewn about the room.

Then Mrs. Seligman discovered a masked man beneath her bed. She heeded his warning not to scream, but, retaining her presence of mind as he crawled from his hiding place covering her with a revolver, she backed to the wall and, unnoticed by him, pushed the button connected with the bell which called her maid.

The burglar evidently heard the bell, for he dashed for the door just as the maid was about to enter. The maid screamed loudly, awakening the household. Realizing that the game was up, the masked man jumped through a window and ran toward the lake shore, where he disappeared among the trees.

It is thought the thief arrived at and left the camp by boat, as a police dog followed his footsteps from the camp to the water's edge, where the trail was lost.

Investigation showed that the robber had also been in the room of Mrs. Lewisohn and that several pieces of jewelry of value were missing.

No complete list of the missing articles has been given out, but it is known to include a diamond ring valued at \$4,500 and a green jade necklace of great value. It is believed that the robber was a New York professional and pawnshops throughout the State and in Montreal are being watched in an effort to recover the stolen jewels.

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
